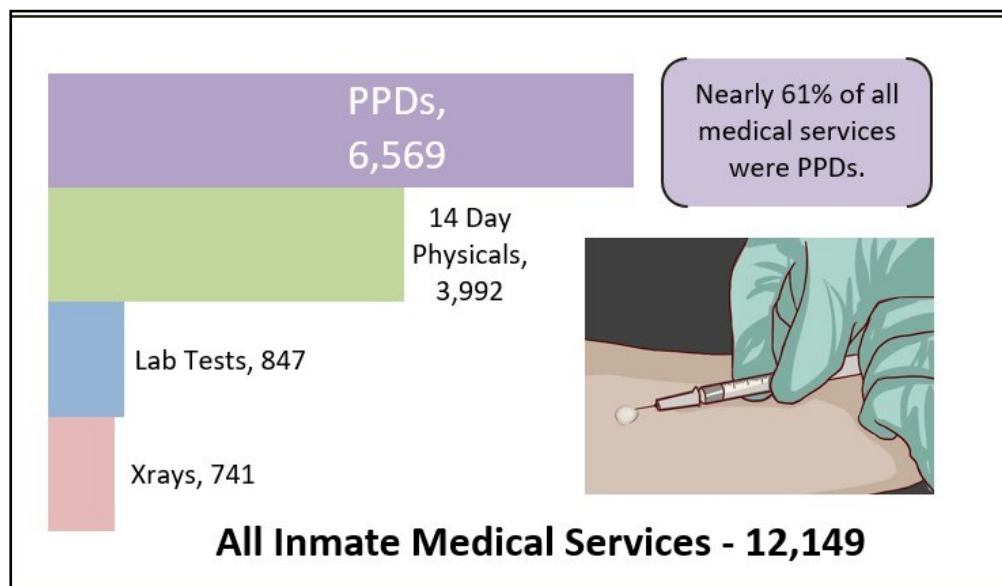


OPERATIONS BUREAU-MEDICAL

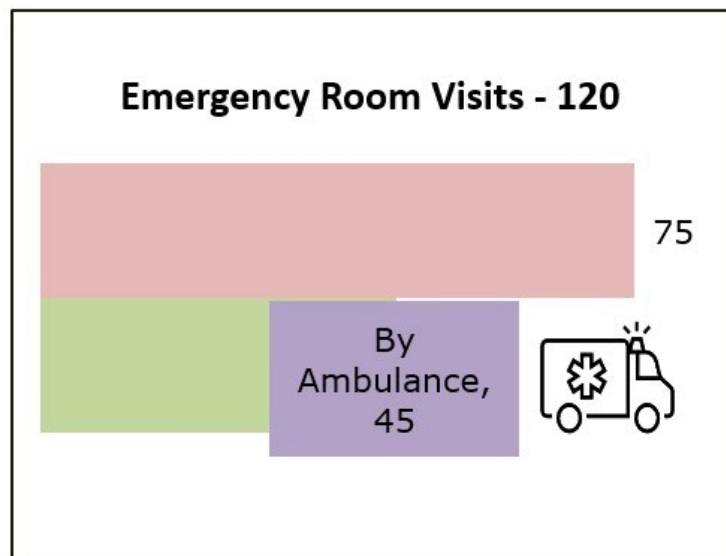
Providing access to appropriate care while incarcerated can serve as a critical first step toward recovery and help establish a continuity-of-care plan upon release.



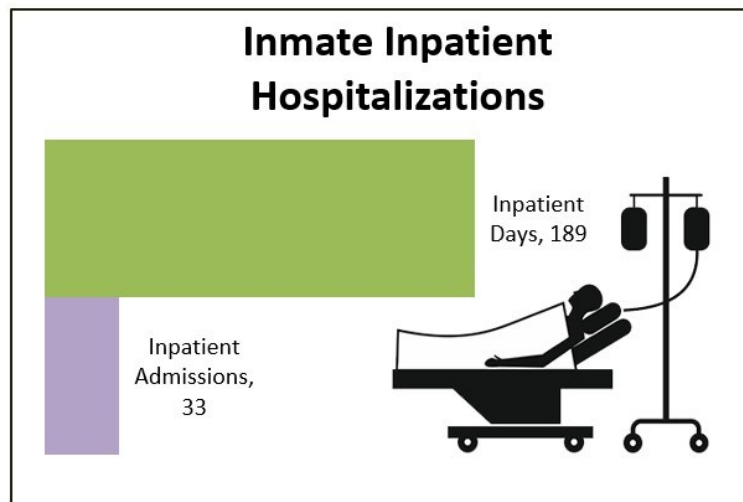
OPERATIONS BUREAU-MEDICAL

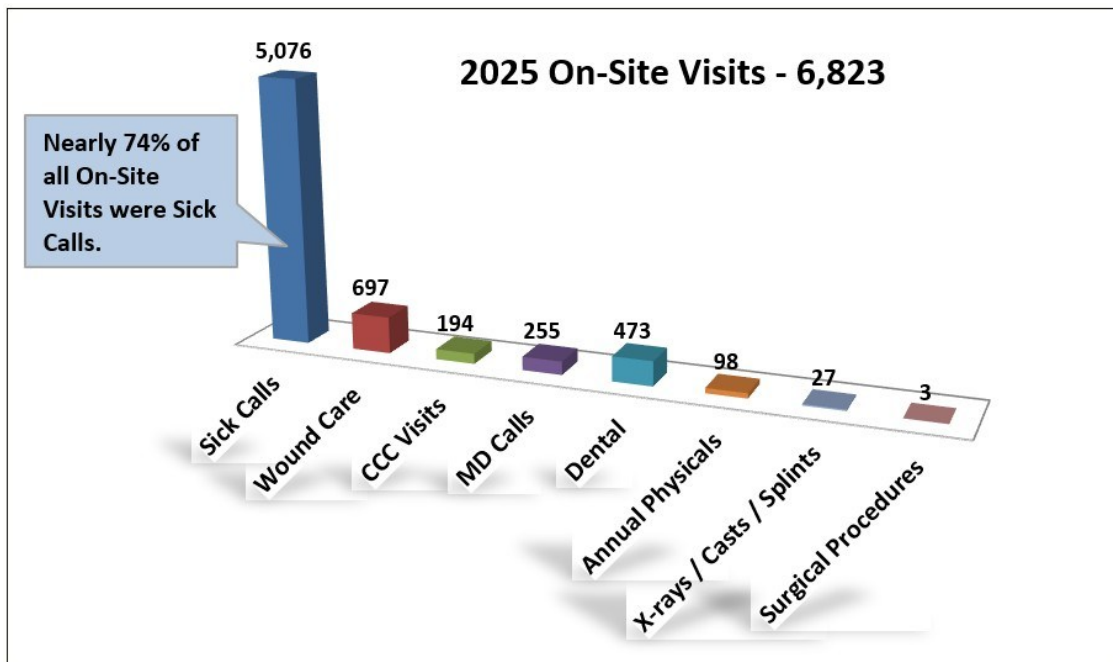

While these medications are not a cure for mental illness, they play a critical role in stabilizing symptoms and supporting overall mental health.

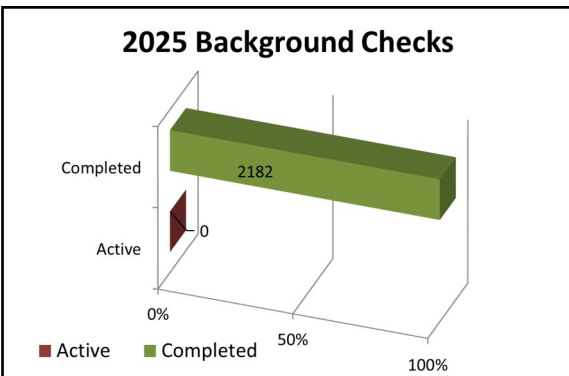
Dental services are provided to individuals in custody as part of our comprehensive healthcare program. In 2025, 473 inmates received dental care, supporting their overall health and well-being.



PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS BUREAU-INVESTIGATIONS

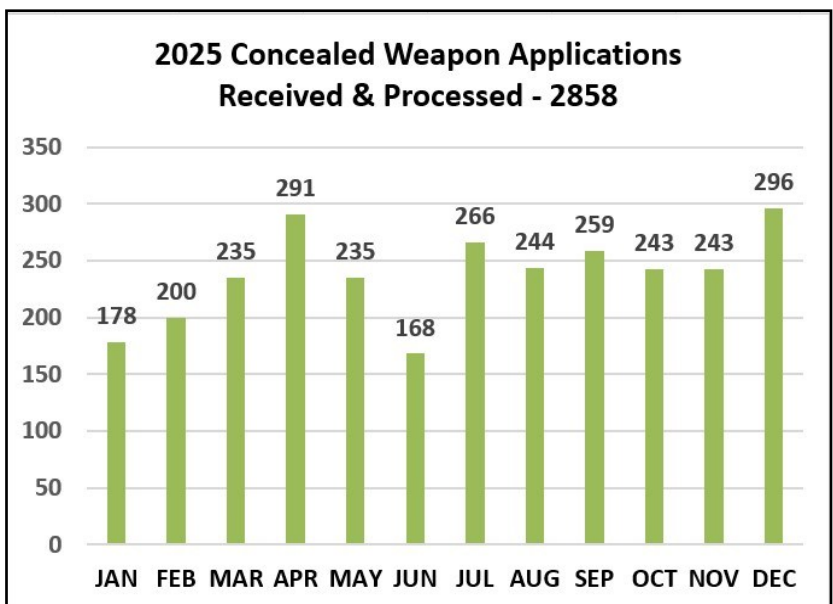
Professional Standards personnel manage a wide range of investigations critical to maintaining accountability and public trust. They review incidents reported within the Newport News Sheriff’s Office—whether involving employees, contracted personnel, or inmates—ensuring each matter is handled thoroughly and objectively. In addition, the unit collaborates with local, state, and federal partners on criminal investigations across the Hampton Roads region.

These partnerships strengthen our collective ability to address complex community issues, enhance transparency, and produce outcomes that benefit both the agency and the public we serve.

The Newport News Sheriff’s Office received and processed more concealed weapons permit applications in 2025 than in 2024. Under Virginia Code § 18.2-308.02, applicants must meet specific eligibility criteria to obtain a five-year permit to carry a concealed handgun. The Professional Standards Bureau plays a critical role in this process by conducting thorough background investigations to help ensure applicants are not legally prohibited from possessing a firearm. These reviews apply to both initial applications and permit renewals, supporting a process that prioritizes public safety and legal compliance.

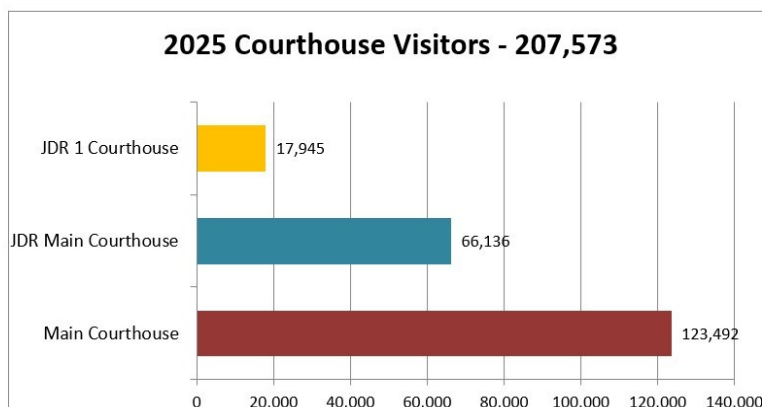


SERVICES BUREAU-COURT SECURITY

Court Security personnel are responsible for maintaining the orderly conduct of court proceedings and ensuring the safety of everyone who enters the Newport News courthouses—including judges, jurors, attorneys, and citizens conducting business. In 2025, more than 200,000 visitors passed through the City’s three courthouses without incident, reflecting the effectiveness of these security operations.

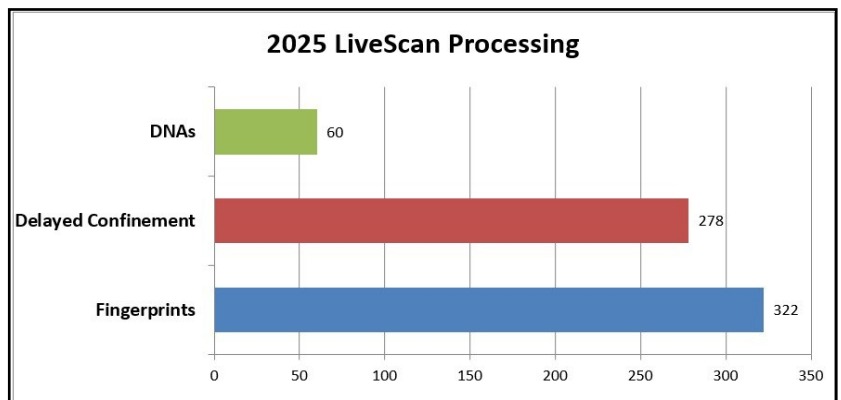
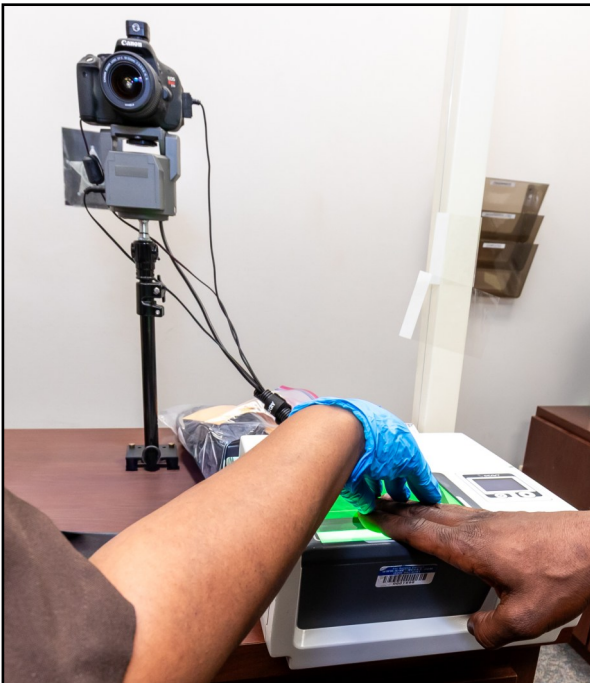

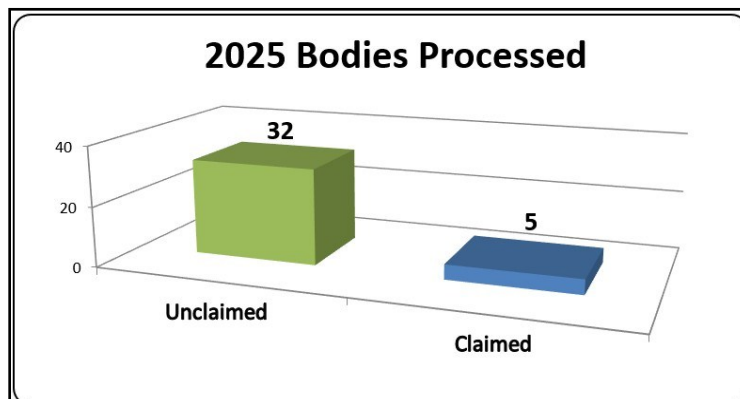


SERVICES BUREAU-LIVESCAN

Not everyone facing criminal charges is immediately incarcerated; some individuals are released on bond or issued a summons to appear in court at a later date. If convicted, individuals are processed using the LiveScan system, which captures fingerprints, photographs (mugshots), and, in certain cases, DNA samples. In 2025, more than 600 individuals were processed using this technology.



Another responsibility of the Services Bureau is to locate next of kin for individuals who have died and remain unclaimed. When relatives cannot be identified or decline to claim the deceased, the Sheriff petitions the court for authorization to proceed with a dignified disposition of the remains.

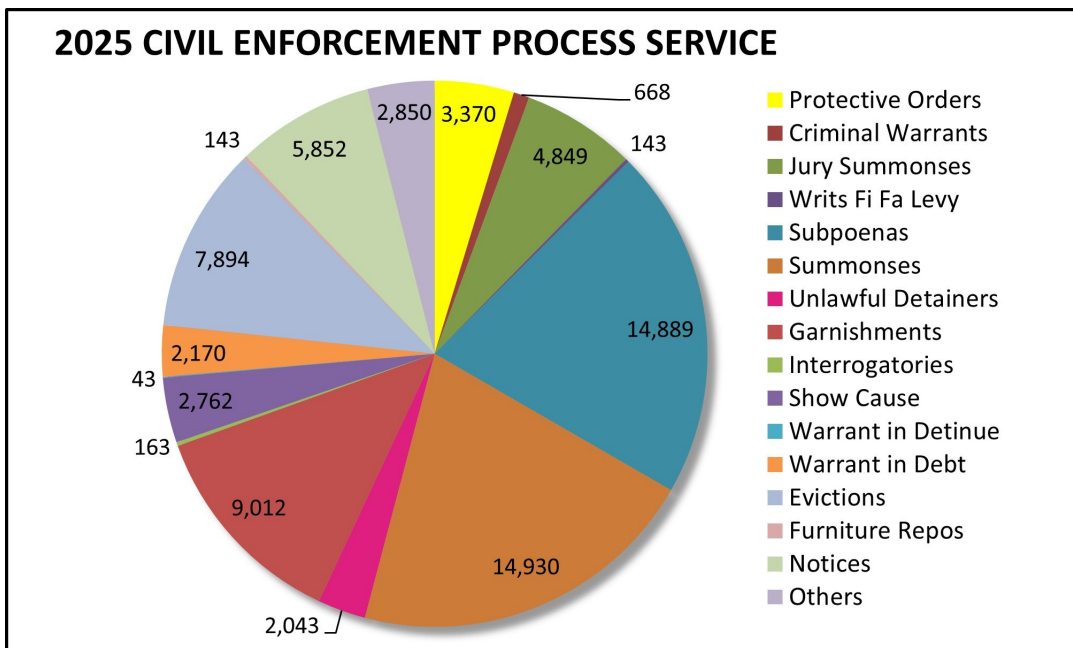


SERVICES BUREAU-CIVIL ENFORCEMENT

Civil Enforcement deputies spend most of their day out of the office serving papers and taking actions that are ordered by the courts. Among the documents we deliver are summonses, subpoenas, and protective orders.



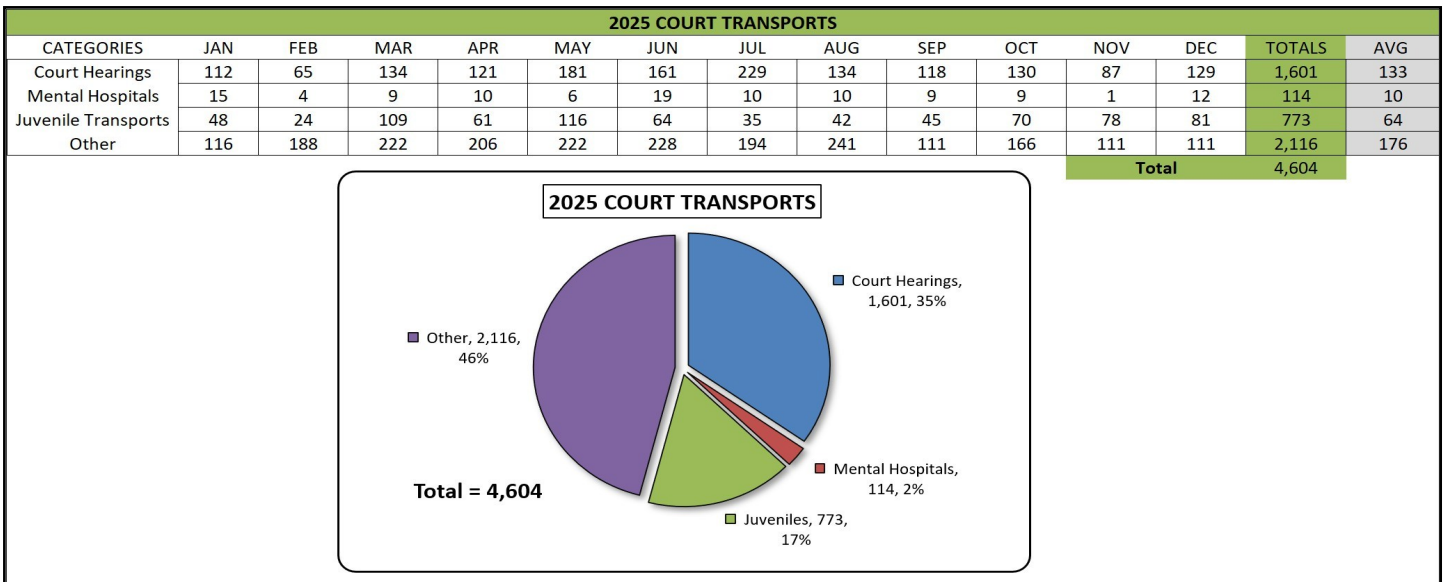
Deputies are also responsible for evictions in conjunction with property managers, levies, and they conduct property auctions.



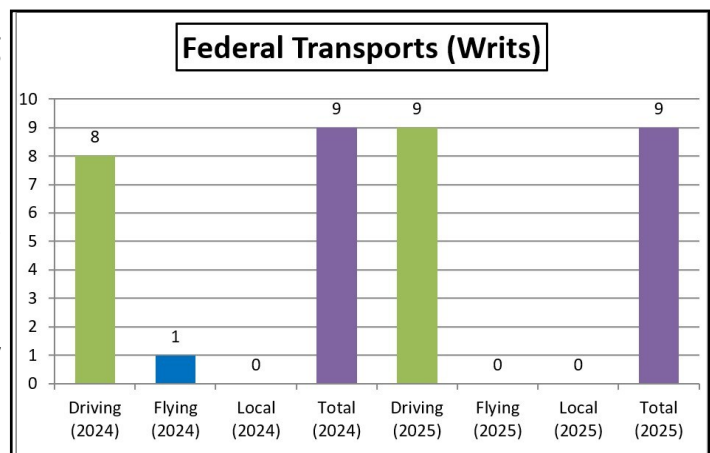
SERVICES BUREAU-TRANSPORTATION



The Services Bureau is responsible for the transportation of incarcerated individuals. Deputies coordinate and conduct transports to courts in other jurisdictions, state correctional facilities, and off-site medical appointments beyond the Jail and Annex. In 2025, the Bureau completed more than 4,600 transports, underscoring the scope and logistical complexity of this critical function.

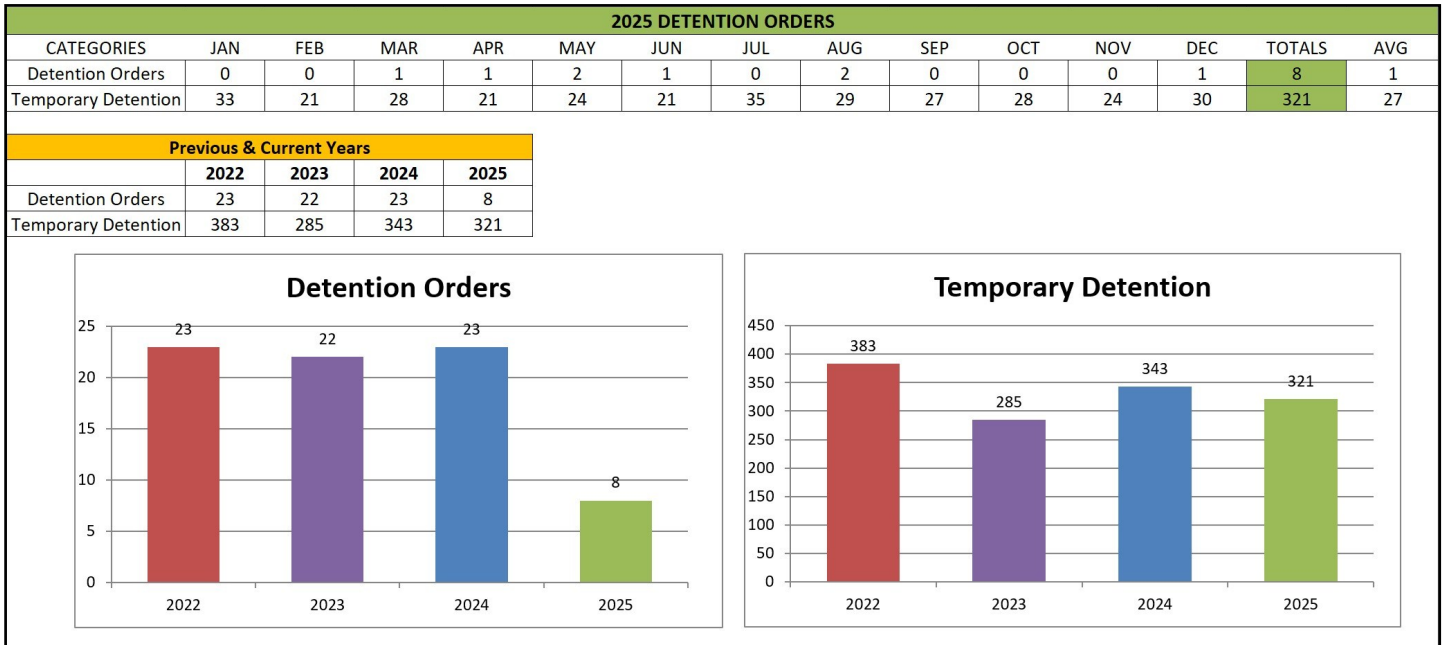


A writ is a court-issued order directing that a specific incarcerated individual be produced before the court. Transportation deputies execute these orders by ensuring individuals are moved safely, securely, and efficiently—whether by ground transport or commercial airline.

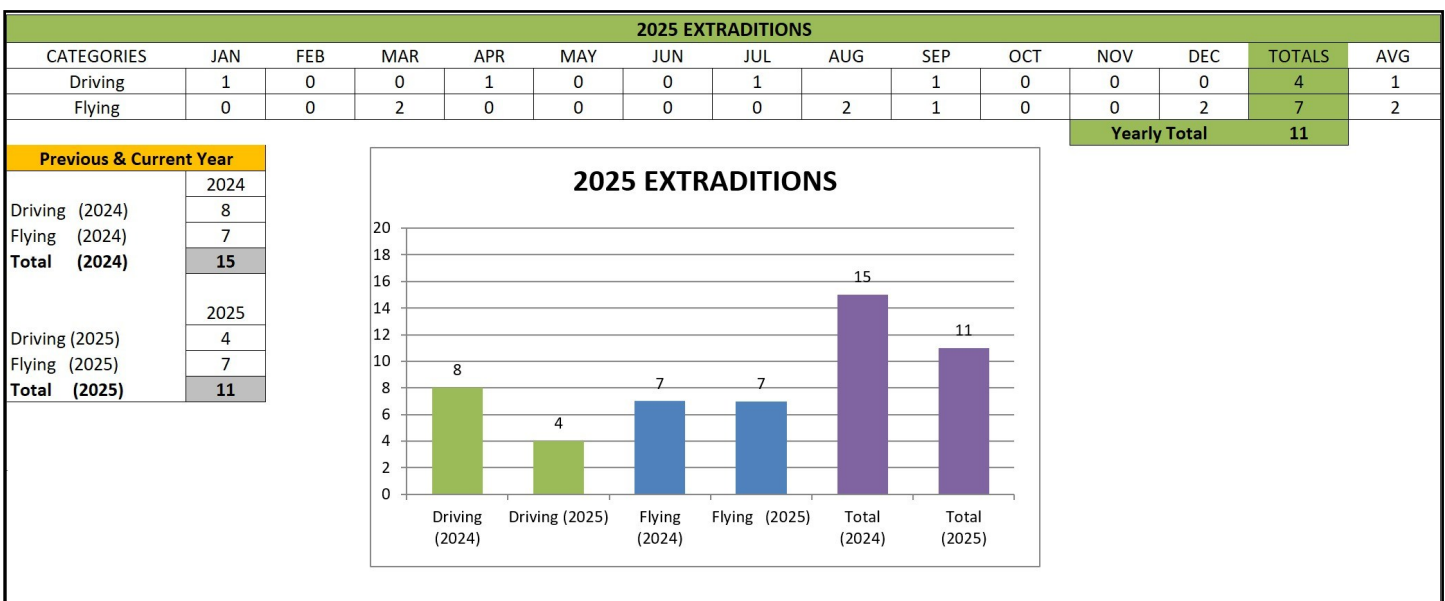


SERVICES BUREAU-TRANSPORTATION

Services deputies also manage Detention Orders, Temporary Detention Orders (TDOs), and Extraditions. Extraditions are conducted either by ground transport or commercial airline, depending on distance and circumstances.

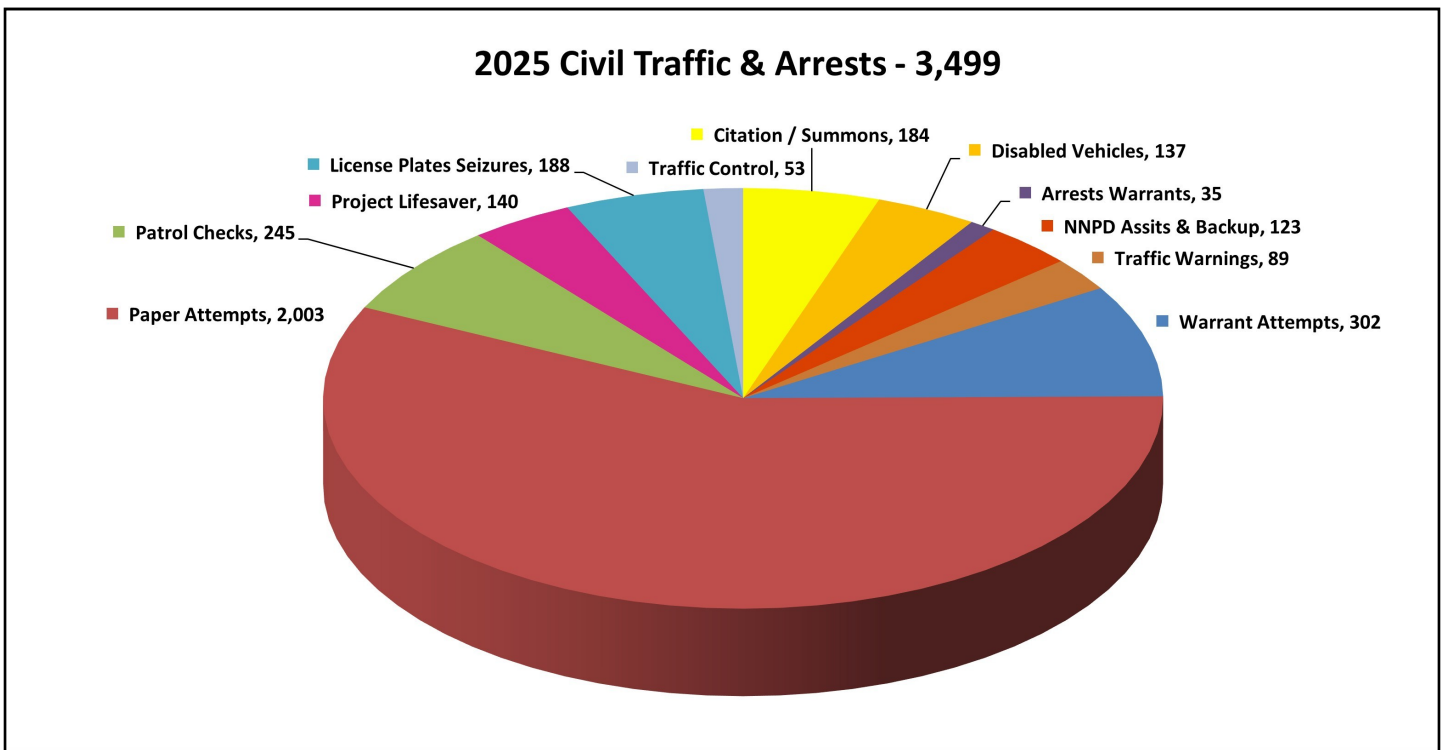


In 2025, the number of extraditions, TDOs, and detention orders decreased compared to previous years.



SERVICES BUREAU-CIVIL ENFORCEMENT

Deputies also conduct traffic stops, write tickets, and make arrests in collaboration with the police department.



A Project Lifesaver bracelet is replaced.

Civil deputies connect with families enrolled in our Project Lifesaver program, checking on them and making sure the equipment their loved one wears is working properly. Batteries in the tracking anklets and bracelets are replaced every 30 days. These bracelets help us find children and adults who wander away so we can return them to their loved ones.

SERVICES BUREAU—SHERIFF'S WORKFORCE

The Sheriff's Workforce is made up of deputy sheriffs who supervise carefully vetted inmates assigned to community work details. These crews operate year-round, supporting city operations by setting up for public events, maintaining streets and right-of-ways, assisting with moves to municipal storage sites, and working in coordination with the city's 311 center to address citizen service requests.

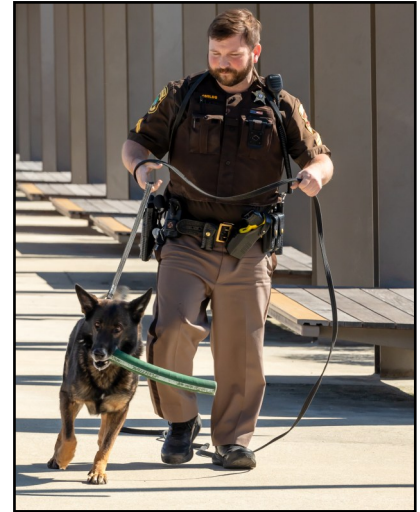


The Sheriff's Workforce saved the City more than \$1 million in 2025.

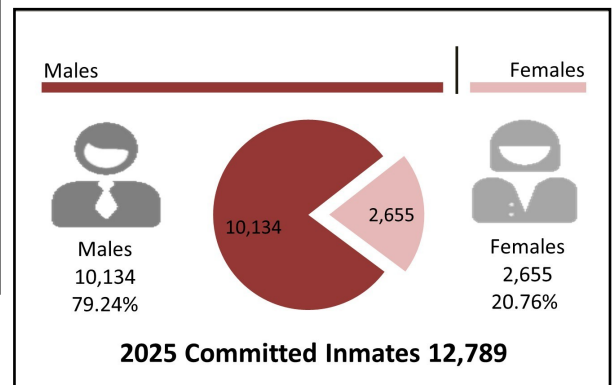
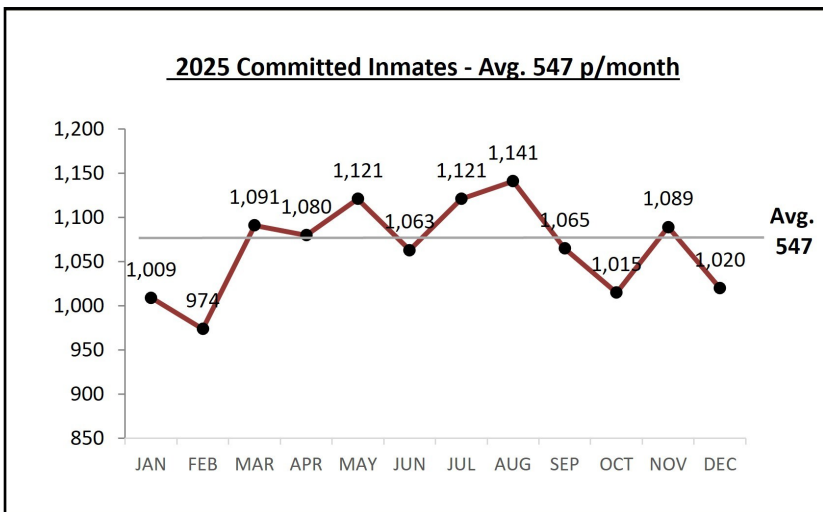
JAIL OPERATIONS

The Operations Bureau oversees everything that happens inside the Newport News City Jail and Annex. Much like a small city, it supports hundreds of individuals who rely on the Newport News Sheriff's Office for housing, meals, medical care, sanitation, laundry, and other essential daily services. Deputies assigned to the jail also maintain security,



ensuring the safety of staff and inmates housed there, whether they are awaiting court proceedings or serving their sentences. In 2025, the jail was a temporary home for approximately 12,789 men and women an average of 547 per month.

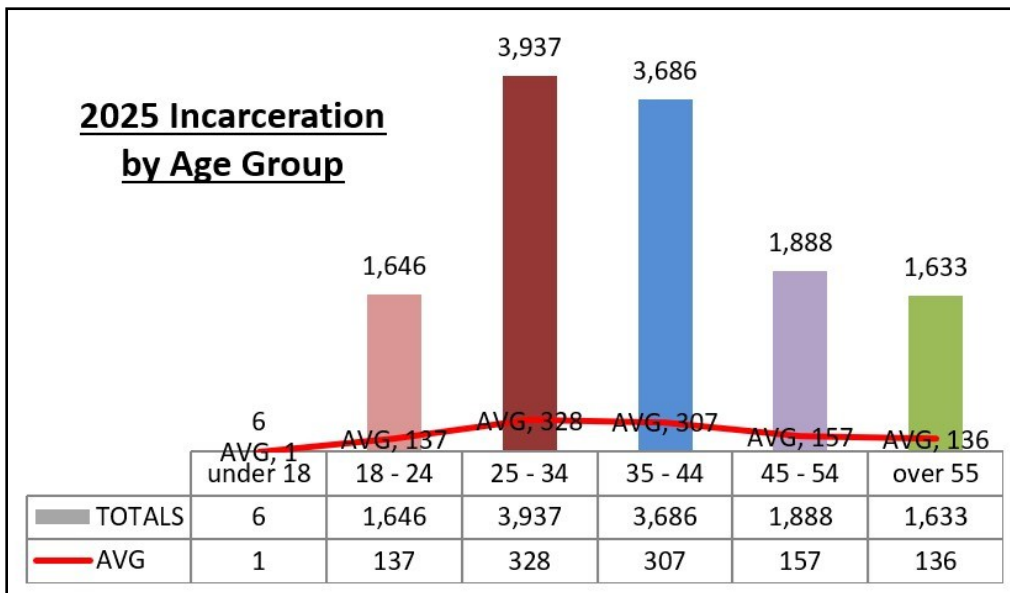

In 2025, Blacks made up 70% of inmates, Whites 29%, with 0.20% identified as Asian/Native American and Pacific Islander heritage.



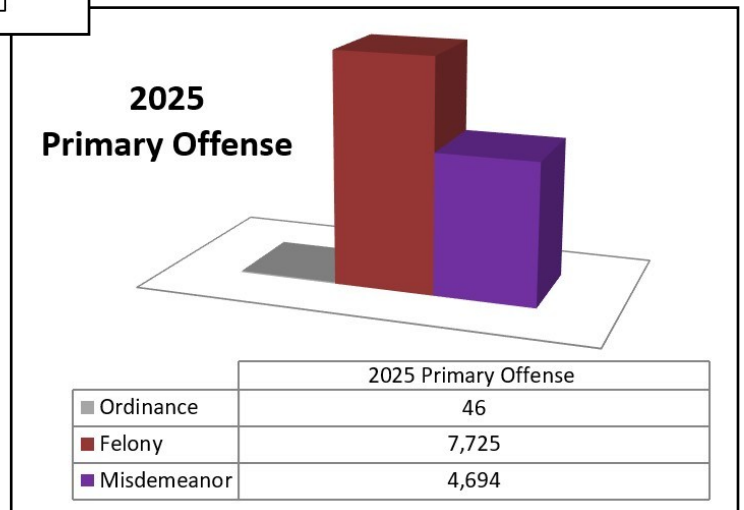
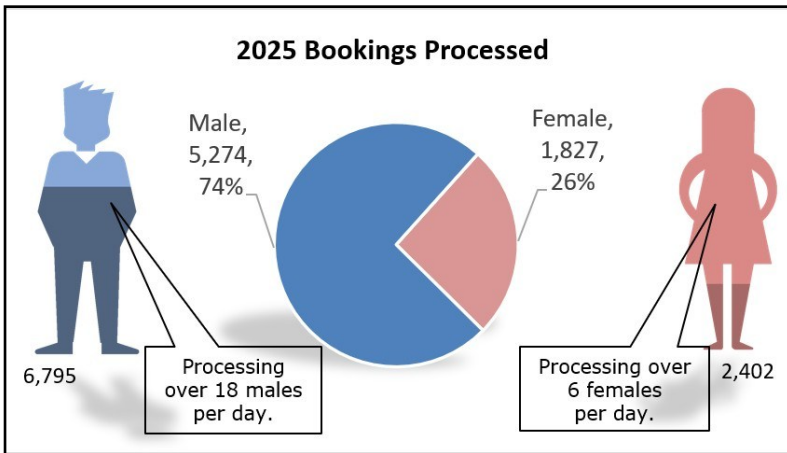

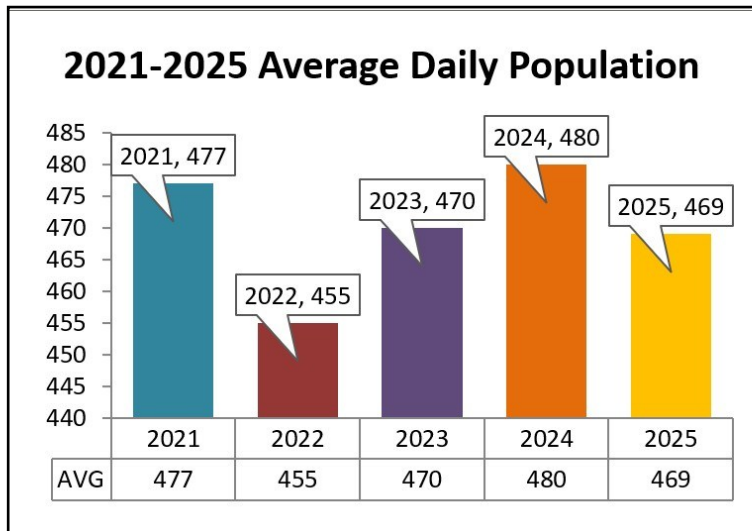
We closely track intakes and releases to maintain an accurate, real-time understanding of the population in our custody. This coordination enables our deputies, medical staff, and re-entry team to effectively support individuals as they enter our facility and to assist returning citizens in successfully transitioning back into the community.



JAIL OPERATIONS—CLASSIFICATION

Housing decisions are made through the classification process. In 2025 the main jail and annex average daily population was 469. Once a person is booked, we keep detailed records to determine housing assignments, medical and specials needs and for tracking where inmates are located. That kept the kitchen busy preparing 15,057 meals a month on average.

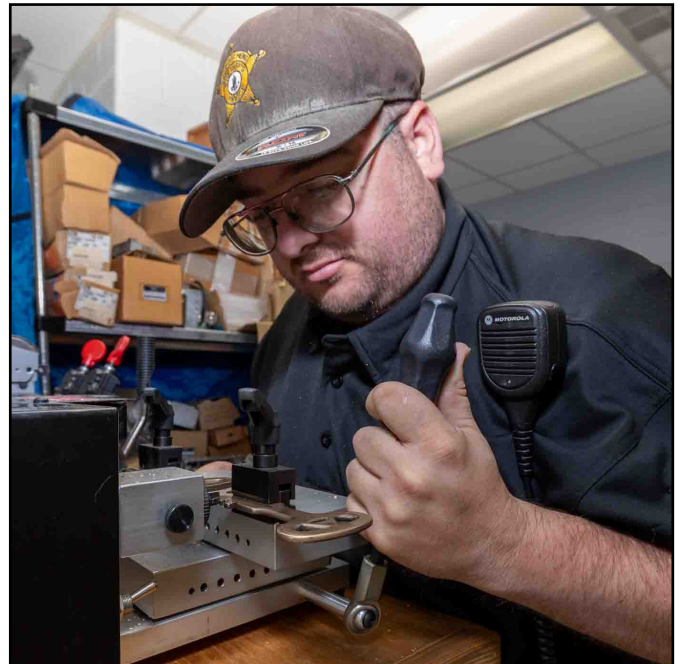

The Jail Maintenance Division is made up of deputies and carefully selected inmates with the skills to complete a wide range of work in-house. These inmates,

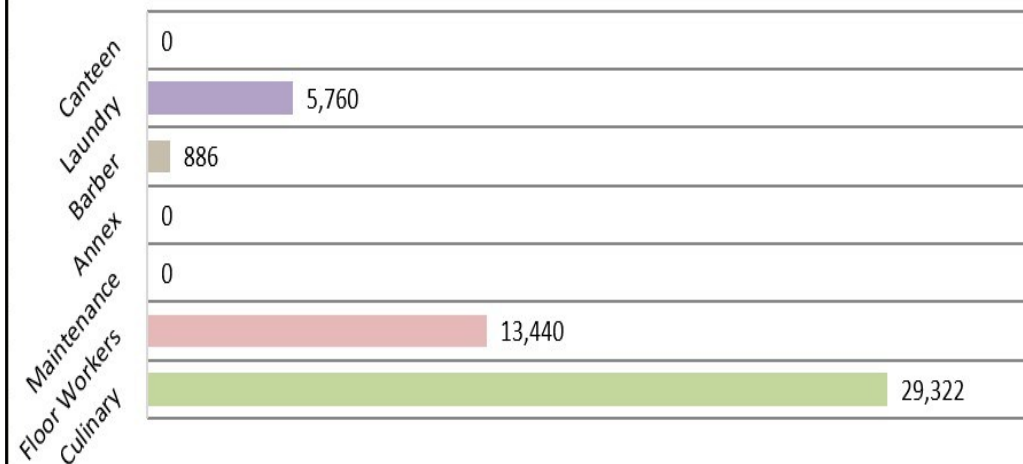

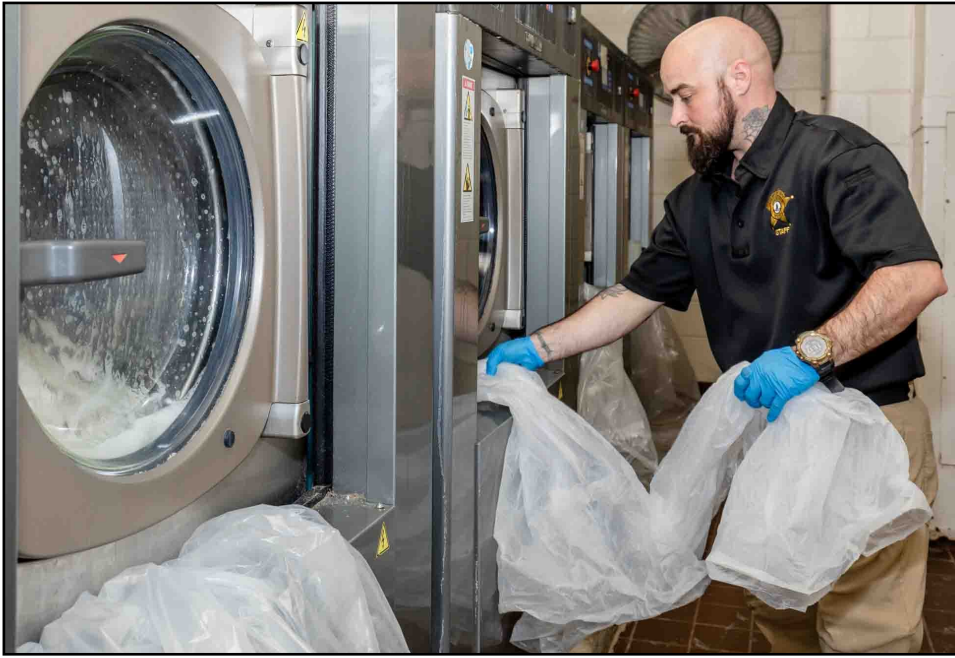

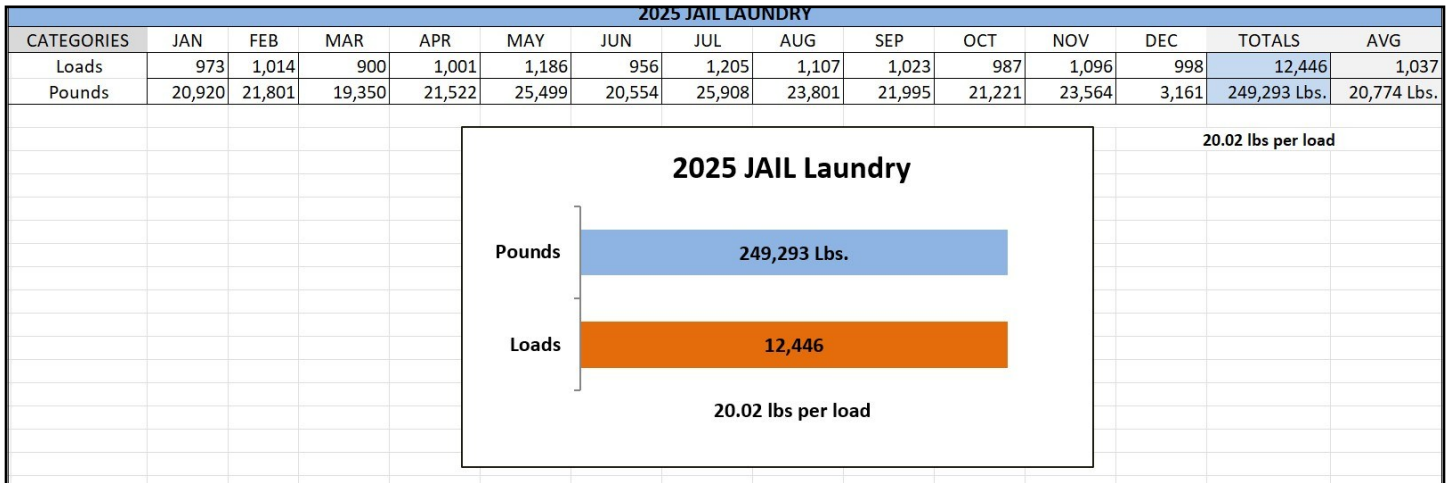
2025 Inmate Labor Saves Tax Dollars



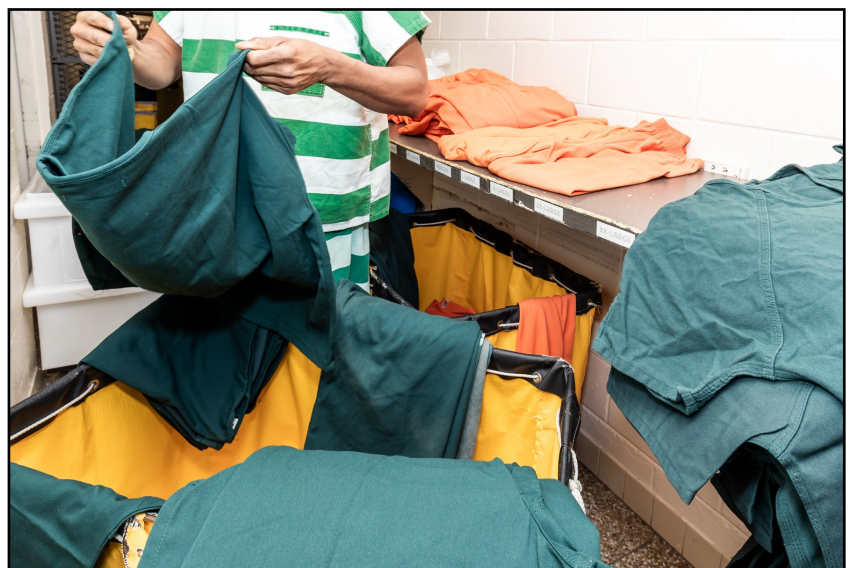
JAIL OPERATIONS-MAINTENANCE



Housing thousands of inmates each year generates a substantial volume of laundry. Staff and inmate trustees manage the cleaning of bedding and clothing within the jail's laundry operation.



Under the leadership of Sheriff Morgan, this effort also extends to the community, with trustees laundering bedding for local homeless shelters during the winter months. Bags of linens are brought to the jail. We clean them so they can be picked up the next day. This helps prevent the spread of disease in the close quarters of a shelter.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND PROGRAMS

The Community Outreach and Programs Bureau provides classes, training, and resources for individuals who are motivated to improve themselves while incarcerated. Participation is voluntary, though
